





Winter Soldier (dir. Lucy Phenix, 1972, 96 min, USA, English, Color, Video) -- North Carolina Premiere of this film!



This devastating documentary was shunned by TV networks and theatrical distributors in 1972. At the height of the Vietnam War, more than 100 honorably discharged, and in some cases highly decorated, veterans gathered in Detroit to put their denunciation of the war on the record, detailing horrors they witnessed firsthand or personally committed. The event was organized by recently returned veteran John Kerry and other antiwar activists such as Jane Fonda and Dick Gregory. The purpose was to tell the American public about the ugly realities of the war and to let the soldiers unburden themselves.

The Imperial's Ism (dir. Alexander Kort and Thomasi Macdonald, 1993, 7 min, USA, English, B&W, Video)
The short video indicts the management of the Imperial Chicken Factory in North Carolina, whose workers, mostly black women, died in a disastrous fire because they had been locked inside to prevent theft. Macdonald's impassioned reading of his own poem, tested against the restraint of Kort's grainy images, dignifies even this grotesque casualty of capitalism.






